Chapter 20 - "Reindeer Games"

Chapter 21 - "And a Partridge in a Pear Tree"

For Christmas, Arnold's father saved \$5 to give Arnold as a gift. "He could have spent that five bucks and stayed drunk for another day or two. But he saved it for me. It was a beautiful and ugly thing," Arnold says (151). Describe your best or worst holiday memory (any holiday, including your birthday). What made it "the best" or "the worst"? What were your hopes or your expectations? In what way did the day surpass or fall short of those hopes or expectations?

Chapter 22 - "Red Versus White"

"I mean, yeah, Indians are screwed up, but we're really close to each other. We KNOW each other. Everybody knows everybody. But despite the fact that Reardan is a tiny town, people can still be strangers to each other. I've learned that white people, especially fathers, are good at hiding in plain sight" (153).
